
Charis Ministry Partners is looking for someone to act as Treasurer. Responsibilities include:

Treasurer Duties

- Write and mail out checks to vendors. Normally 4 or 5 checks a month
- Enter checks and receipts into QuickBooks. This takes approximately 1 hour or less per month. Deposits are made by Todd Smith at Food To You.
- Enter debit card transactions from bank statements. About 5 to 10 per month.
- Reconcile bank accounts, 4 accounts.
- Review and print out financials for monthly meeting. Preparing bank recons, entering debit transactions and printing out reports takes 1 hour or less per month.
- Other duties during the year:
- Send out invoices as needed for special donations (1 or 2 a year)
- Prepare annual report with State of SD
- Print out reports for CPA firm to prepare annual tax return
- Renewal sales tax exemption every 5 years

We have a subscription from TechSoup for our QuickBooks. It can be downloaded onto your computer.



Happy New Year! The word "new" shows up a number of times in Scripture, and most often it has to do with God's activity. Let us start out this new year meditating on the following verses from Scripture:

Psalm 40.3 – "He put a <u>new</u> song in my mouth a song of praise to our God."

Isaiah 43.19 – "I am about to do a <u>new</u> thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"

Isaiah 65.17 – "I am about to create <u>new</u> heavens and a new earth ... "

Lamentations 3.22-23 – "The steadfast love of

the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are <u>new</u> every morning."

Ezekiel 36.26 – "A <u>new</u> heart I will give you, and a <u>new</u> spirit I will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh."

John 13.34 – "I give you a <u>new</u> commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another."

1 Corinthians 11.25 – "In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the <u>new</u> covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.""

2 Corinthians 5.17 – "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a <u>new</u> creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

Ephesians 2.15-16 – "He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one <u>new</u> humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it."

1 Peter 1.3 – "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a <u>new</u> birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead ..."

Revelation 21.5 – "And the one who was seated on the throne said, 'See, I am making all things new."

As we enter into 2021 with all of its uncertainties, let us pay attention to the ways God is doing a new thing in your life and in the life of our church. When all else is uncertain, one thing is for certain: God's love for you in Christ Jesus our Lord. And this love always has the power to put a new song in our mouth, to give us a new heart and a new spirit, to give us new birth, and make all things new.

2021 ELCA Fund for Leaders Scholarships:

The Fund for Leaders, a ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), provides scholarships for future ELCA pastors and deacons who attend ELCA seminaries. In 2021, the Fund for Leaders will once again be offering scholarships to seminary students — and we need your help to spread the word!

The Fund for Leaders has an open application process that allows all eligible candidates to apply online directly to Fund for Leaders to be considered for a full-tuition scholarship. These scholarships will cover the full cost of seminary tuition for the duration of coursework. Eligible candidates must have an offer of admission from one or more ELCA seminaries, be planning to enroll full time in fall 2021 and be in good standing in the ELCA candidacy process. Recipients of Fund for Leaders scholarships may apply their full-tuition scholarship to any ELCA seminary that has offered them admission.

The application period will be open from November 2020 to February 2021. The Day the World Came to Town: 9/11 in Gander, Newfoundland-When 38 jetliners bound for the United States were forced to land at Gander International Airport in Canada by the closing of U.S. airspace on September 11, the population of this small town on Newfoundland Island swelled from 10,300 to nearly 17,000. The citizens of Gander met the stranded passengers with an overwhelming display of friendship and goodwill.

Take This Bread: A Radical Conversion-Early one morning, for no earthly reason, Sara Miles, raised an atheist, wandered into a church, received communion, and found herself transformed—embracing a faith she'd once scorned. Miles didn't discover a religion that was about angels or good behavior or piety; her faith centered on real hunger, real food, and real bodies. Before long, she turned the bread she ate at communion into tons of groceries, piled on the church's altar to be given away.
