IT'S TIME!

Daylight Saving Time ends for this year on Sunday November 6, when most of us will move our clocks back one hour.
Growing up on a farm in Northern
Minnesota, however, we never changed

our clocks. My dad said that the cows needed to be milked at the same time every day, morning and night, regardless of human attempts to move the clock forward and back.

Still, such changes can provide an opportunity to reflect on how we use our time: for example, that extra hour we gain in the fall (granted, we lose it again in the spring). It might be that we spend that extra hour catching up on sleep, or that project we've been putting off, or spend extra time with family or friends. Or digging into the Bible. Or just relaxing!

Later in November comes a time to be thankful. While we can be thankful every day we are alive on this earth, and thankful, too, for the promise of a resurrection after we die, Thanksgiving Day provides a special moment in time to renew our thanks to the God who created, provides for, protects, redeems, and breathes life into us and all of creation.

At the end of this month we encounter another time to stop and reflect. The season of Advent begins Sunday, Nov. 30. Advent is the four weeks before Christmas, during which Christians prepare to celebrate the coming of Jesus, the Word of God made flesh, into the world.

People prepare for Jesus' coming in different ways: some by lighting candles in an Advent wreath or using an Advent calendar. Some congregations offer extra worship opportunities. At Augustana, we will light Advent candles each week, and worshippers will begin receiving the insert "Taking Faith Home" in the bulletin, which they can take home and use during the week.

It's time! Time to change the time, time to give thanks, and time to prepare for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ!

AUGUSTANA AT 140, PART 2

Here are some more history tidbits for God's House at Augustana Lutheran Church. Specific details are available in the Pastor's office and Gail Jereb room. Growing up to 140 years. Thanks be to God.

Imagine a lot, in 1921, at the corner of 7th & Prairie, being what could be deemed as "the little brown church in the wildwood."1925 brought the completion of that the little brown church – at present day being Augustana Lutheran Church. The first service was held on the second Sunday in February, 1926. Dr. John Pearson was serving as the pastor. Dr. Pearson thoughts, as cited in the Argus Leader, on serving a small congregation (resonating with the current status of the church) declared that "the greatness of a church is not be measured by its size." The size of the church or the congregation does not make a great church. A great church is accomplished by sharing of talents and tongues to spread the greatness of God.

Growth of the church in the 20's saw a Sunday school addition being added and a house on the west side being added for a parsonage (later becoming additional space for Sunday school). In the 70's, the house on the south side of the church became the Youth house for confirmation classes and Luther League activities). The need for an elevator and accessible bathrooms became a clear need as time progressed. 2005 saw an upstairs addition with a fellowship hall, restrooms and an elevator, the latter being an innovation with much gratitude from pallbearers.

Ministries (Luther League Sunday school, Bible study, book club, AA meetings, Al anon meetings, Food to You, LOGOS, PdD, women's group, Vibrant Faith – just to name a very few). Two incredible ministries occurred in the 1950's under Pastor E H Baker. Bethany Lutheran Home was established, the first of it's kind in Sioux Falls, as a place to serve, care, and love those whose lives needed an extra dose of kindness. Augustana also had a generous hand in aiding St. Mark's Lutheran "pursuit of it's embarkment on their ministry."

The church has seen many pastors come and go. Augustana Lutheran has been through two world wars, two pandemics, industrial revolution, no phones to cell phones, and a moon landing. An incredible ongoing list of innovation, destruction, resurgence and reflection. Through all of this, the Holy Spirit has led the peoples of Augustana Lutheran to carry out His work. May the church continue to faithfully serve our creator, and carefully listen to His leading of Augustana Lutheran Church.




Noisy Offering-The Noisy Offering is going to Church on the Street.




St. Dysmas Christmas Sack Project

Each year the chaplains' group that serves those incarcerated in our prisons and jails packs and distributes a Christmas treat sack to every inmate at the South Dakota State Penitentiary in Sioux Falls, the Mike Durfee State Prison in Springfield, the minimum-security unit in Yankton, the Women's Prison in Pierre, and the inmates in the county jail in Sioux Falls. Unfortunately, due to new policies, home-made fudge will no longer be allowed in any of the state facilities.

But you can still help St. Dysmas with a financial gift. Everything they hand out must be prepackaged items from the factory, which means they must purchase everything they hand out. This increases the cost of this project significantly. They expect to distribute goodies to over 3,670 inmates this year. **Their goal is to raise \$27,000 by Friday, November 11**th so they have time to order the goodies and receive them in time to hand them out before Christmas Eve.


